FRESHFORD HOUSE MUSEUM: DONATIONS BY THE HARRISON FAMILY

Freshford at no. 31 Kellner Street, Bloemfontein was designed and built by the architect John Edwin Harrison for his young bride, Kate Caroline (nee Marchant), from England. The house, named after the village Freshford in England, where Caroline Harrison was born, was completed in 1897 and the Harrison family stayed there until August 1901. At the end of the Anglo Boer War the Harrisons left for England for a short while. Most of their furniture was sold in Bloemfontein before they left. At present Freshford is being restored by the National Museum as a period house museum.
