This edition of the *Journal for Contemporary History* is dedicated to Prof. Daan Wessels, former head of the Department of Political Science at the University of the Free State (UFS), and currently a research fellow and study supervisor in that department. At national level, he has enjoyed recognition as a respected scholar in Political Science circles. As a member of the Constitutional Committee of CODESA, and as a consultant to the Independent Electoral Commission, he made an important contribution to the process of constitutional reform during the run-up to the 1994 election. He is known for his insightful political comments and analyses during various national and local elections.

All of the contributors have some or other personal and/or professional ties with Prof. Daan – some as former students, others as colleagues.

Included amongst these contributions are articles pertaining to the domains of political theory, dynamics and tendencies in South African politics (including constitutional development, election politics and ethnic politics, the requisites of sound governance, the relationship between democracy and local and foreign policy, as well as the transformation of the Defence Force). Other authors have provided a closer examination of related aspects of the South African historical context, as well as trends regarding security within the broader framework of the African continent.
